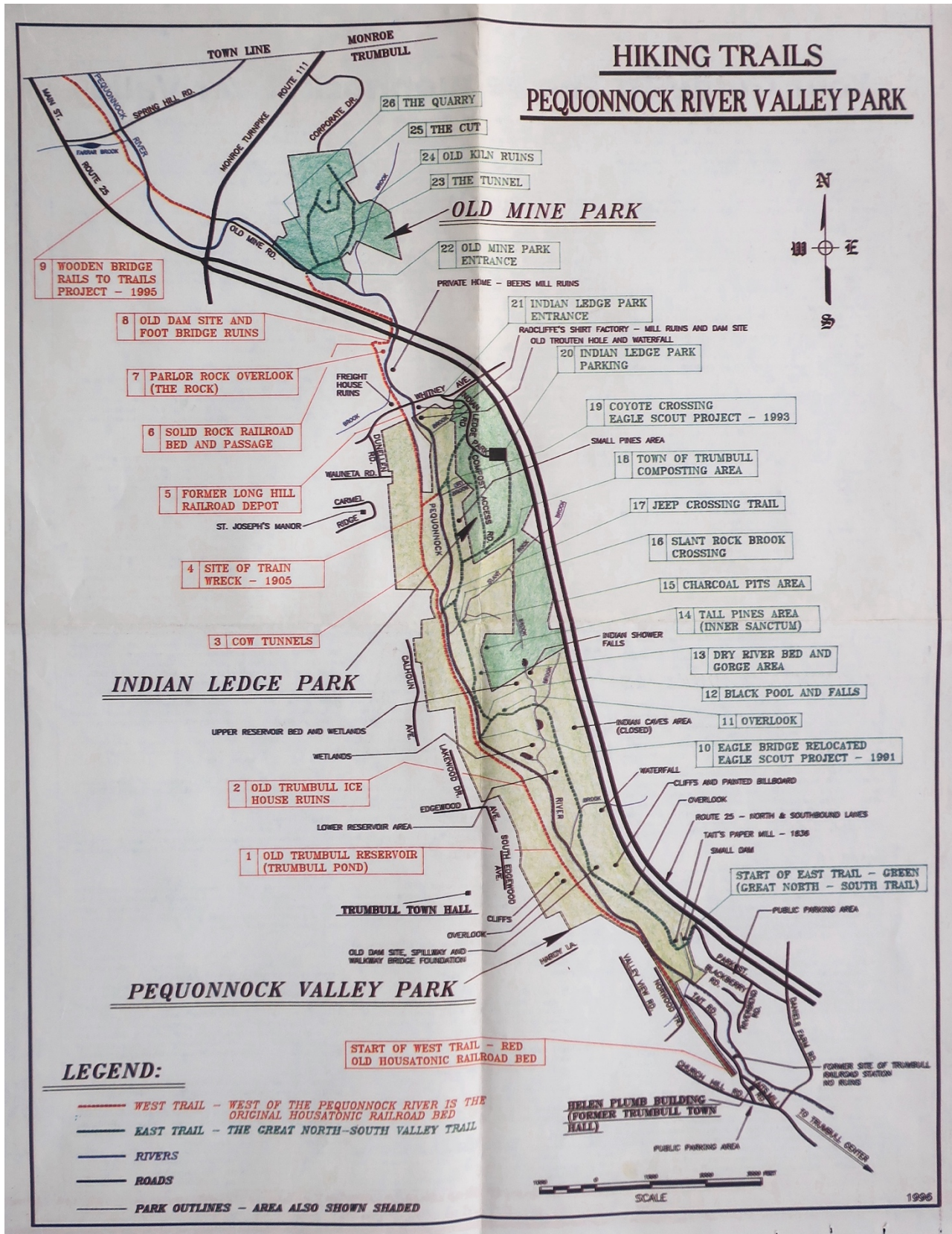
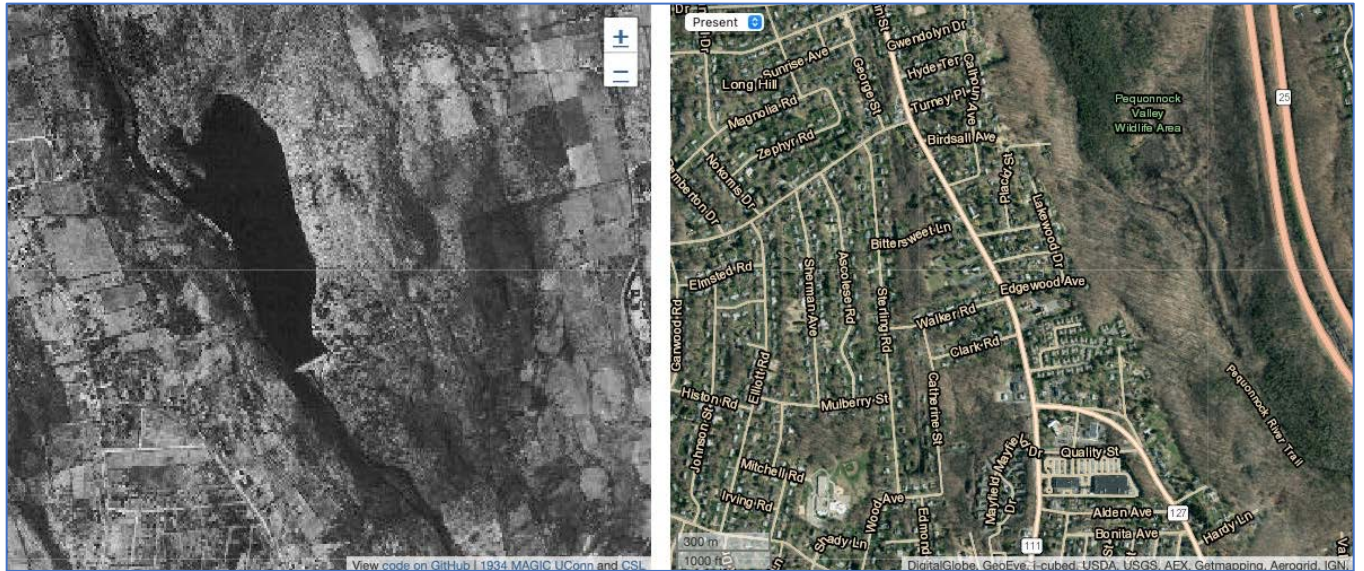


These are a selection of photos for the Pequonnock River Valley, which cover some of the topics referenced in the various Pequonnock Valley guides.
The map from the 1996 Pequonnock Valley guide.



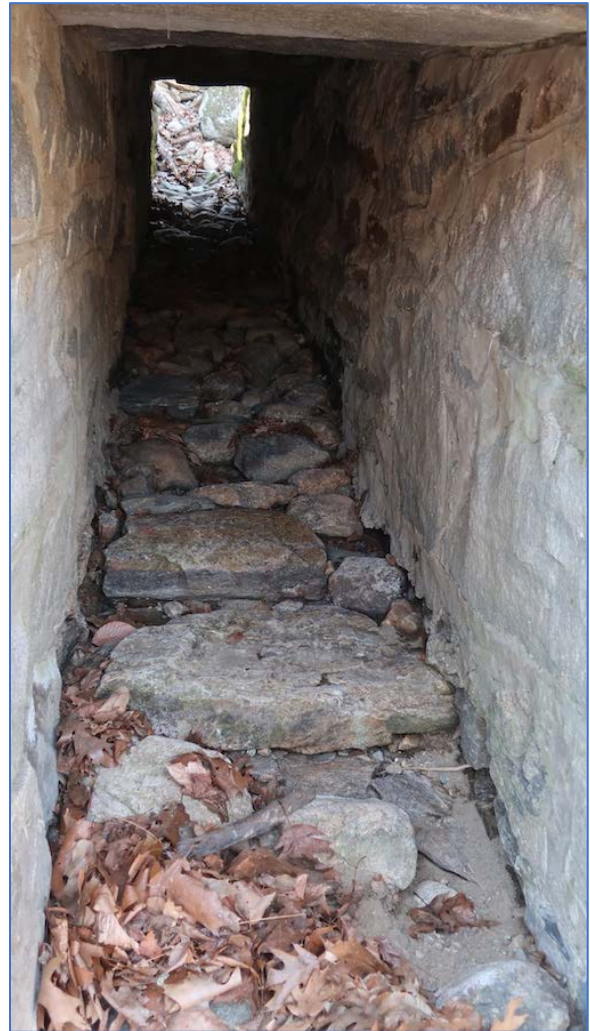
The Trumbull Reservoir is visible on the left in the aerial photo from 1934, while the low area where it was once located can be seen in the modern aerial photo from 2016. The remains of the dam are visible slightly off the Pequonnock River Trail, 0.95 miles north of Tait Road, in Feb. 2022.



The Trumbull Ice House foundation is clearly visible from the Pequonnock River Trail in Feb. 2022. The foundation is even more impressive when viewed from the river side.



There are six large tunnels under the Pequonnock River Trail. The interior of the tunnel on the left has a relatively smooth floor and is located 1.85 miles from Tait Road. The tunnel on the right with stepped rocks is located 1.35 miles from Tait Road. The left tunnel is most likely one of the two cow tunnels, while the tunnel on the right is probably used for drainage. Both views are east to west in these photos taken in Feb. 2022.





The tunnel in the top photo is the eastern face of the cow tunnel at mile 1.85. This tunnel is 72 inches high at this face and is 45 inches wide, as seen in Feb. 2022.

The bottom photo is the west face of the tunnel at mile 2.05 miles from Tait Road.



A beaver lodge is located in the former reservoir bed of the Pequonnock River Valley in Feb. 2022, 1.2 miles north of Tait Road.

One of the two footbridges that used to span the Pequonnock River is seen washed downstream, 1.95 miles north of Tait Road in Feb. 2022. This is the Coyote Crossing bridge, formerly located 2.4 miles north of Tait Road.



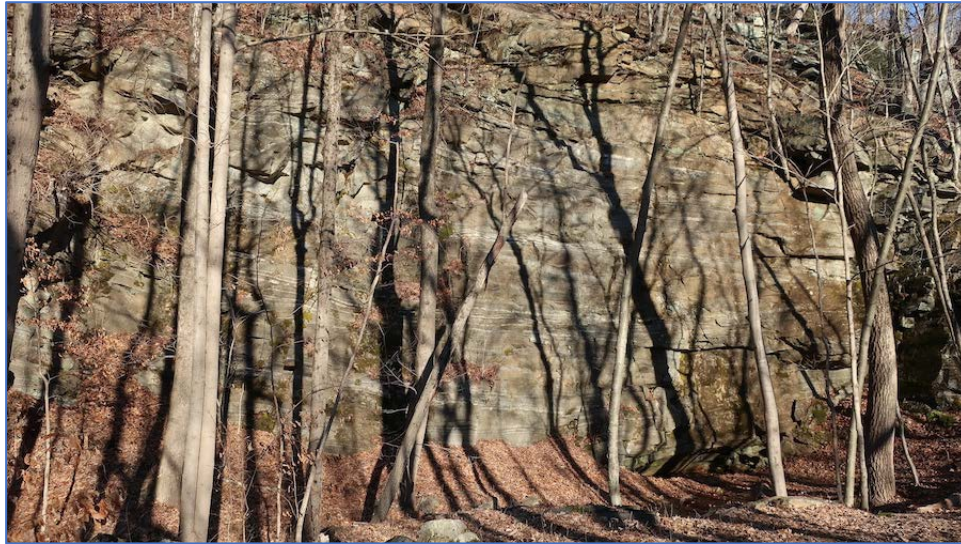
Parlor Rock Park is visible in the center of the aerial photo from 1934 with Lake Hi-Hi north of Whitney Avenue and Lake Lo-Lo, south of Whitney Avenue. Kaatz Pond is visible to the right in both photos, the one from 1934 and the modern one from 2016. The Pequonnock Valley flows through Parlor Rock Park in a snowy scene from Feb. 2022 in the area that was once the location of Lake Hi-Hi.



The Pequonnock Valley and Old Mine Park are two of the panels for the three-sided kiosk in Old Mine Park by the bridge, as seen in Feb. 2022. The third panel (not pictured) is entitled Streamside Buffer.



Old Mine Park has remnants of its mining past visible along the trails. The quarry wall, the Champion Lode, and Lane's Mine are seen in these photos from Feb. 2022.



The spring by Little Eden and the Dynamite Storage Tunnel are two features from the mining history at Old Mine Park, as seen in Feb. 2022.
